### RAT CONSUMPTION BY MARGINALIZED COMMUNITIES IN TERAI

The poverty-stricken communities such as Santhal, Bantar and Rishidev in Sanischare of Pathari, Morang eastern Nepal have been preying on rats for food since long period of time. They explore the paddy fields and hunt down rats in their burrows. They also search for foxes, rabbits, wild cats and mongoose for meal to supplement nutrition for community members.

#### ART AIDING HIV INFECTED MOTHERS

The anti-retroviral therapy (ART), by which HIV-infected mothers can give birth to uninfected babies is being considered as a boon for them. According to ART Centre at Bharatpur Hospital, Chitwan, southcentral Nepal, since 2007 to date, 69 out of 72 children born from HIV-infected mothers, were uninfected whereas three inherited the infection from their mothers. At present, ART services from the Centre, aided by AHF Nepal, is being attained by 672 patients.

#### **HUNTERS BECOME SAVIORS FOR DWINDLING GHORAL POPULATION**

The hilly VDCs of Nawalparasi district central Nepal, are now witnessing concerned efforts for the conservation of Himalayan ghoral (Naemorhedus goral) through formation of youth committee, by the same locals who used to hunt them in the past. Locals also earn revenue from tourists who come to the village to see ghorals. Out of the four species of ghoral found across the globe, only the Himalayan ghoral is available in Nepal. The rare species is protected in Khaptad National Park, Shey Phoksundo National Park, Langtang National Park, Dhorpatan Hunting Reserve, and in the Mahabharata ranges.

#### **CLIMATE CHANGE; WOMEN ARE MORE VULNERABLE**

Rural Nepali women are badly hit by climatic vulnerability such as changing weather patterns, increase in natural calamities, and increase in the frequencies of extreme weather events resulting in low agricultural productivity. A report prepared by Women's Rehabilitation Centre show that women are key person responsible for cultivation and harvesting of food crops. Mostly, they face problems of food, water scarcity and spend their potential time travelling long distances in search of potable water.

## **NEW LANDFILL SITE UNDER CONSTRUCTION**

A new landfill site is under construction at Banchare danda on the border of Nuwakot and Dhading districts, central Nepal for sustainable waste management of Kathmandu Valley. The under-construction landfill site is expected to hold waste for at least 20 years after its completion. The government has acquired 89.757 hectare of land for the development of necessary infrastructures with an estimated budget of NPR 2.45 billion.

#### **ENDANGERED SPECIES PANGOLIN FOUND IN 43 DISTRICTS OF NEPAL**

The national survey of pangolin, mammal of the pholidota order, 2016 documents their presence in 43 districts of Nepal which were initially believed to be found only in 12 districts. The study was conducted by Small Mammals Conservation and Research Foundation (SMCRF) with support from Ministry of Forest and Soil Conservation, USAID and Hariyoban Programme. In Nepal only two species; Indian Pangolin (Manis crassicaudata) and Chinese Pangolin (Manis pentadactyla) are found.

#### **CONGENITAL DISEASE HIGH IN CHILDREN IN TIBET**

A medical team found that children in Tibet are prone to heart disease which is characterized by irregular breathing patterns or immature growth. According to their findings, out of 4,000 children, 40 cases of heart disease were recorded while a data taken in 2015 show that children born with these conditions in low-lying regions is around 0.4 to 0.8% while in high-altitudinal plateaus this is from 1 to 1.3%. As the local hospitals are not sufficiently equipped, children are transferred to hospitals at other regions for treatment.

#### PESHAWAR VALLEY WITNESSING THE DRIEST SPELL

It's been too long since Peshawar valley, north-west Pakistan, has received its last rainfall directly affecting people, wildlife and the crops. Scarcity of rainwater has made the surrounding areas dry, dusty and polluted while crop and orchid yields are expected to be low and there might be lack of food and grasses for wild animals. However, a light rainfall is expected in the mid of December that could possibly break the dry spell in Peshawar. Meanwhile, problems of hay fever, allergies, skin irritation, anaphylaxis and respiratory tract infections have surfaced along with the drought in Islamabad, Pakistan.

#### **DEATH FROM MEASLES REACHES 10**

The fear-gripped resident of Shangla, Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa, north-west Pakistan witnessed death of 4 children during last four days bringing the death count to 10 while several others are hospitalized due to measles outbreak. Anti-measles vaccination campaign managed to vaccinate 800 children in two days period and all available resources are being used to control the hazard. However, the spread of disease is still rapid and the concerned locals are demanding medical aid from the government.
