#### **HEAVY SNOWFALL IN HUMLA DISTURBED LIVES AND TRANSPORT**

As the temperature dropped below minus 15°C, the snowfall in Humla, north western Nepal has increasingly affected normal life of the locals finding it hard for them to go outside of their houses. The snowfall has disrupted the regular transportation system of the district.

According to the Meteorological Forecasting Division (MFD), the temperature has dropped across the country due to rains and snowfall. #### TONS OF TOXIC MERCURY RELEASED

According to a government report, an estimated 6.79 tons of mercury was released into air of the country in the fiscal year 2016-2017. The total mercury released was mainly attributed from different sources and activities like gold plating, use and disposal of mercury-content products, waste incineration, open dumping, energy consumption, and many more. The metal mercury is highly toxic and has adverse effects on human health and overall environment.

#### **EXCESSIVE USE OF PESTICIDES IN COMMERCIAL VEGETABLES**

The vegetable products grown in Jhapa, eastern Nepal were found to contain high level of pesticides in it. A test carried out on the vegetable samples by experts showed the broccoli (*Brassica oleracea* var. *italicia*) and onions (*Allium cepa*) contained 65 percent pesticide content which is very high and is unsafe to human health. ## China Himalaya

#### RARE ALPINE QUILLWORT SPECIES DISCOVERED

A rare quillwort species has been found in Sichuan Province, south western China. According to Sichuan's provincial bureau of forestry and grassland, the Chinese endemic alpine quillwort species, *Isoetes hypsophila*, was discovered in a nature reserve in Ganzi in Tibetan Autonomous Prefecture. It is the rarest species which is under Class-I national protection which have been found in high altitude wetlands, lakes, and marshlands in Sichuan and Yunnan, south western china.

#### TIBET INVESTING MORE ON ECOLOGICAL PROTECTION

#### LIFE CYCLE OF LUDLOW'S BHUTAN GLORY RECORDED

Bhutan becomes the first country to record Ludlow's Bhutan Glory (*Bhutanitis ludlowi*) life cycle in Bumdeling in Trashiyangtse, north eastern Bhutan. The butterfly which is also Bhutan's national butterfly, was listed vulnerable under International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN). Awareness programmes and plantation of more host plants are planned to protect the species.
