NEPAL EARTHQUAKE UPDATE

As of 29th of May, 2015, the Government confirmed 103,686 cases were treated and 31,707 patients were admitted in the hospitals. 1.1 million People require sanitation service. 32,145 classrooms have been destroyed or partially damaged. 236,000 farming households are affected in six districts. (Nepal: Earthquake 2015 Situation Report No.19, OCHA). The table below shows the 15 most affected districts death toll and casualties.

- As the first phase of the emergency is winding down the majority of the foreign military personnel have now departed. With the approaching monsoon season the Nepalese military is focusing on the stockpiling of food at forward staging areas and distribution points. Heavy equipment will be prepositioned in landslide prone areas. (Nepal: Earthquake 2015 Situation Report No.19, OCHA).
- It is estimated that the monsoon will last for an average of 105 days, with higher rainfall expected in the eastern compared to the western region. (Nepal: Earthquake 2015 Situation Report No.19, OCHA).
- It is expected that the central region will receive the highest rainfall. The central region is also one of the areas that were highly affected by the earthquake. The monsoon will reach Okhaldhunga, Sindhuli, and Ramechhap first, followed by the central region (Dolakha, Kavrepalanchowk, Kathmandu, Bhaktapur, Lalitpur, Makwanpur, Sindhupalchowk, Nuwakot, Rasuwa, Dhading), and reaching Gorkha last. In terms of agro ecological zones, the hills should receive higher annual rainfall than the mountains. (Nepal: Earthquake 2015 Situation Report No.19, OCHA).
- Social and economic exclusion for some communities such as the Dalit, Deula and religious minorities
 has left them vulnerable after two earthquakes. The combination of entrenched marginalization and
 geographical remoteness, with many living apart from the mainstream settlements, has meant that
 they have not received adequate relief aid. The most affected districts are Sindhupalchowk, Rasuwa,
 Bhaktapur and Bhelukhel. (Nepal: Earthquake 2015 Situation Report No.19, OCHA).
- According to the Financial Tracking service, a report compiled by OCHA on the basis of information provided by donors and appealing organizations as of 02 June 2015 funds received total USD 303.06 million while outstanding pledges total USD 317.8 million.

SMALL HYDRO SHUT DOWN

The small hydro power stations of Kavrepalanchowk district, central Nepal have been shut down by the devastating earthquakes of April 25 and May 12. About 60 kilowatt electricity was being produced from the hydels. This has affected more than 600 households.

WATER SOURCE DRY UP

The water sources at Dhakabang VDC, Argakhanchi district, western Nepal have completely dried after the April 25 major earthquake. More than 715 households and eight schools have been affected. It has forced locals to fetch water from the nearby rivers and other sources.

Likewise the hospitals and health posts have been teaming with patients suffering from diarrhea and fever.

WINDSTORM WREAKS HAVOC

The continuous wind storm has damaged around NPR 100 million at Udayapur district, eastern Nepal. Around 370 houses, 12 schools and 400 electricity poles have been destroyed along with one casualty. More than 3,000 Sal trees (Shorea robusta) in the chure area have fallen down.

APPLE FARMING BENEFITS

The apple farming has been benefiting the farmers of Shimla district, Himachal Pradesh, northern India. In 2014, around 52 metric ton per ha was produced from a single orchard, while in US and China the production was only about 35 to 40 metric ton. At present more than 25 varieties of apples are grown in the orchard.

DEMAND HIGH FOR SPOTTED TURTLES

The spotted pond turtle known as black pond turtle (geoclemys hamiltonii) seized in the recent past in Mumbai and various other parts of the country have high demand in local and international pet markets. About 158 spotted pond turtles were rescued in Muradganj area of Auraiya district, northern India on May 14, 2014. NO POACHING INCIDENTS

The poaching of various wild animals such as Tibetan antelope, wild yaks and Tibetan wild donkeys in Ho Xil nature reserve, Tibet, southern China had remained zero since last nine consecutive years. At present there are more than 60,000 Tibetan antelopes, nearly 20,000 Tibetan wild donkeys, more than 6,000 wild yaks, and 3,000 Tibetan gazelles in the reserve.

CNG DEALERS PROTEST

The Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) operators from Peshawar, Swat, Hazara, Nowshera, Swabi, Kohat and other cities, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, north western Pakistan have protested the imposition of Gas Infrastructure Development Cess (GIDC) by the federal government. The Peshawar high court had already declared GIDC as illegal on June 13, 2013 while Supreme Court had also upheld the decision on August 22 last year.
