LANDSLIDE AFFECTS TOURISM

A 5 km long artificial lake created due to a landslide blocking a tributary near the Kargil headquarters has blocked the famous Zanskar River in Ladakh located in Jammu and Kashmir, northern India. As a result 4,000 people living in the lowlands are prone to flash floods when the ice melts. According to the Division Commissioner of Kashmir, in order to contain the situation, teams have been sent out to restrict the movement of residents and a famous 150,000m Chadar trek has been closed, which has affected tourism in the area.

TIBETAN KEY CULTURAL RELICS RESTORED

Renovation of 14 cultural artifacts have been completed in Tibet Autonomous region, southwestern China. According to Tibet Cultural Relic Bureau, the renovation projects completed accounts for 35 per cent of the total Tibet regional key cultural relic protection locations. So far, China has protected 40 key cultural relic protection sites and six museums during the 12th five-year plan by directing a total investment of 161 thousand dollars.

Locals of Merak and Sakteng, located in Trashigang district eastern Bhutan are delighted to receive economic benefit from production of Gouda cheese that has improved their living condition. The area was famous for fermented or smelly cheese but now they have switched to Gouda cheese production due to its higher return on sale and support received from the department of livestock (DOL). A kilogram of Gouda cheese production costs about Nu 250, while they can be sold at Nu 550.

WATER SCHEMES BENEFIT

Water problem is likely to get solved in Peshawar and Rawalpindi in northern Pakistan as the Central Development Working Party (CDWP) has approved five water projects in the area.
