In China, Tibet had heaviest snowfall after two decades, and Bhutan legalized fishing in the Haachu for socioeconomic development. SANITATION CONCERNS AT SHELTERS FOR FLOOD-VICTIMS

Due to inadequate arrangements by the government, flood and landslide victims in Surkhet District, Western Nepal are still deprived of basic facilities like drinking water and hygienic living conditions. Water scarcity and open defecation are a few reasons that are increasing the risk of a disease outbreak. Records show that 5,603 people are still living in temporary shelter forced to compromise with sanitation.

WHITE-RUMPED VULTURES INCREASING IN NUMBER

An annual survey carried out by Bird Conservation Nepal on the vulture's natural habitat along with counting the birds across the Tarai lowlands revealed rise in number of White-Rumped vultures (*Gyps Bengalensis*), a vulture species that is on the verge of extinction, from 43 in 2011-12 to 68. In the course of the survey, three nests of Redheaded vultures were

also recorded, stated the Vulture conservation program officer at BCN. They were spotted in Salghari of Tansen-12 and Baughapokharathok VDC-5 respectively both in Palpa district located in Western Nepal and in Lanha VDC-6 of Jajarkot district located in Mid Western Nepal.

RAMPANT DEFORESTATION IN BAJURA DISTRICT

Porkhe forest area of Bajura district, Far- Western Nepal spread over 8 ha is rapidly shrinking in size due to unchecked timber smuggling worth millions of rupees annually. Rise in encroachment is another reason for deforestation in the area. Research shows that, more than 500 families of Martadi and Pandusain VDC have cut down trees for cultivation without permits from the District Forest Office (DFO). The forest boasts a wide variety of trees.

ENCROACHED LANDS FREED BY LOCALS

According to a ranger at Bawaiyachor Area Forest Office, a group of locals in Myagdi district, Western Nepal cleared 50 ha of encroached lands of 42 community forests in the district from illegal settlers, through peaceful negotiations among stakeholders. Forest products like firewood and herbs illegitimately and timbers were being used to build huts and livestock sheds. Khumlyamae Community Forest at Bawaiyachour VDC stated that, a minimum penalty charge of NPR 25,000 and suspension of any government facilities would be enforced on those who disregard the evacuation orders.

GROWING NUMBER OF TIGERS IN NEPAL DEMAND MORE SPACE

Successful tiger management programme and effective poaching control mechanisms have led to a rise in number of tigers, with current numbers estimated to be 198, up from 121 in 2009. A research suggests the need of additional 828,200 ha of protected area to meet the goal of 250 tigers. According to an ecologist with the Department of National Parks and Wildlife Conservation (DNPWC), Nepal is being lauded for the achievements in tiger conservation, but the need for additional space and possible rise in human-wildlife conflicts are major challenges facing the country.

HYDROPOWER IN CHINA

In south west china large hydropower station is planned in the middle reaches of the Yalong River in Sichuan's Garze Garze Tibetan autonomous prefecture with the capacity of 3 million kilowatts power generation and a total reservoir capacity of 10.8 billion cubic meter investing about 107 billion USD. The river's hydropower resources will provide sustainable clean energy for the regional economy of southwestern and eastern China. The first generator will come into service at the end of 2021 and the entire station is to be completed in 2023.
