STONE QUARRIES DISCOVERED

In an effort to make the supply of stones, sands and pebbles sustainable, the department of Mines and Geology has discovered 95 new stone and aggregates quarries across the nation. They were distributed at 18 different places in 14 districts. Inadequate basic infrastructures like roads and electricity might delay the extraction in near future.

WASTE MANAGEMENT OBSTRUCTION

Waste management has been ineffective and irregular in Kathmandu, central Nepal in the shortage of vehicles to carry waste. Around 70 percent is still on the streets due to obstructions created by locals in Sisdol dumping site. They have been demanding compensation for a 4 year old boy killed by a private tripper carrying waste. One excavator, two dozers

and one loader had then been set on fire.

Most of them were woman and senior citizens. Though the injured say it was a leopard, officials deny this saying the injury was caused by a rabid dog.

CARDAMOM EASING LIFE

Large cardamom is now a major source of livelihood for the farmers of eastern Nepal. In the first six months of the present fiscal year, 1,400 tons were exported from six districts earning NPR 1.48 billion to its farmers. India is the major market followed by Gulf countries. Apart from large cardamom, agro-products like tea, meat, fresh vegetables, lentils, ginger are also main exports of the region.

SOLAR POWER TO CHEPANGS

Chepangs, an indigenous community of Chitwan district, central Nepal, has been provided with 48 solar panels. It is expected to improve living standard of the community allowing children to study at nights. The cost of each panel is NPR 11,000 of which NRS 5,600 is government subsidy.

WATER WOES

Water scarcity has been affecting many parts of the country. Residents of Darbung VDC, Gorkha, western Nepal are forced to manage with just two gallons of water per day. After water pump failure to extract water from Madi river, residents of Damauli, Tanahun district are being forced to drink muddy waters of local streams. Acute water shortage has forced people to migrate from their ancestral home in Bijuwapani VDC in Panchthar district, eastern Nepal.

WILDFIRES DECREASE

Wildfire has been limited to 12 from 200 in average within 24 hours in 2009 due to calm weather, up-to the third week of March this year across the country. Experts suggest to remain on alert as the season of wildfire is still not over. Nepal has been listed as "most vulnerable to wildfires" by US-based National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

FLYING SQUIRREL RESCUED

A sporadic small mammal, Hodgson's giant flying squirrel (*Petaurista magnificus*) was rescued from two strangers of Dirang Basti, Arunachal Pradesh, northeast India. The rare species of eastern Himalaya range from Myanmar to Nepal glides among sub-tropical and temperate forests is protected under the Wildlife (Protection) Act 1972 of India.

WILD BUFFALOES RELOCATED

Two Asian Wild Buffaloes (*Bubalus arnee*) after more than two years of ex-situ rehabilitation were discharged in the Bura Chapori Wildlife Sanctury in Assam, Northeast India. They were earlier rescued under different situations by IFAW-WTI-run Centre for Wildlife Rehabilitation and Conservation (CWRC) from the Kaziranga National Park (KNP). The large bovine is native to the Indian Sub-continent and Southeast Asia and listed as Endangered in IUCN Red list since 1986.

INCREASED WETLANDS

Tibet forestry officials have claimed 38,000 plus wetlands with an area of 6.72 million ha within its boundaries, claiming it to be the second-largest wetland area in Tibet Autonomous Region, southern China. About 66 percent, i.e. 43 million ha of wetlands is protected by 23 projects investing USD 56 million for its conservation and maintenance. The survey initiated in 2010 ascertained 524,000 more hectares of wetlands in the region than previously. Human intervention and exploitation were reasons behind 99 % of lately established wetlands.

SNOW LEOPARD SIGHTED

Three snow leopards (*Panthera uncia*) have been sighted while pursuing their prey at Jigme Dorji National Park (JDNP) around 4,050m above sea level, northern Bhutan. Their population has been estimated in between 11-17 supported by previous blue sheep (Pseudois nayaur) survey.

LEOPARDS POISONED

The poisoned corpse of three leopards abandoned at roadside was discovered by regional Wildlife Department from Abbotabad, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province, northeastern Pakistan. IUCN has ranked it as a 'near threatened' endangered species and are generally killed for skins
