LANDSLIDES WREAK HAVOC

Several parts of the country have been affected by heavy rainfall and landslides. Incessant rainfall in Duragaun, Ramechhap district, central Nepal, has caused mudslide in quake-hit vulnerable land. Likewise, highway of Oyam, Panchthar district, eastern Nepal has been obstructed, while electricity poles and wires were damaged. Similarly, a child has been found dead after being buried in a massive landslide in Taplejung. Two people have lost there lives in Banepa. Roads have been affected by landslides in some VDCs of Rasuwa.

The barren lands of upper Mustang, Western Nepal have turned green as afforestation that beagan in 1992 continues. Specially, Bhote Peepal (*Ficus religiosa*) is the preferred species for its suitable growth and favourable environment. Mainly, Lomanthang, Chosher, Chondhup, Ghami, Chusang and Surkhang VDCs had been involved.

FLOODS IN ASSAM

UPGRADING TEACHING HOSPITALS

The provincial government of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, northwestern Pakistan, has allocated PKR 1,770 million for the renovation, beautification, repair and cleanliness of the four teaching hospitals. Around PKR 300 million for Lady Reading Hospital (LRH), PKR 700 million for Khyber Teaching Hospital (KTH), 400 million for Hayatabad Medical Complex (HMC) and PKR 370 million for Ayub Medical Complex (AMC) have been distributed.
