LABS TO TEST PESTICIDE RESIDUE

The government of Nepal will begin setting up laboratories to test pesticide residue in fruits and vegetables in five more cities across the country within two months. Two years ago, Ministry of Agriculture Development announced plans to set up such laboratories in different parts of the country to address growing concern over excess use of pesticides. The lab uses Bioassay for Pesticide Residue (RBPR) technology to test pesticide residue. April 17

Shortage of fodder for domestic animals, arrival of new diseases and epidemics are some of the problems faced by local farmers when hybrid paddy varieties are cultivated.

WATER CRISIS IN TERAI

More than a dozen of villages in northern Mohatari district, central Terai region of eastern Nepal, are facing acute water shortages due to drying up of water sources. Exploitation of adjoining Chure hills, uncontrolled deforestation and long drought are the major causes for water sources drying up. Likewise, water sources of many areas in the eastern region of Nepal have dried up creating a severe water crisis .Biratnagar, the city in eastern Nepal is struggling to manage water for the residents.

HANDMADE PAPER FACTORIES RESUME PRODUCTION AFTER 10 YEARS

Handmade paper factories in the Bajhang district of the far-western region have been re-registered with the authorities to resume production. These factories had to halt their production due to high production costs, shortage of raw materials, lack of manpower and the Maoist insurgency. Nepali handmade paper 'Lokta' is used for official and ceremonial purposes and is one of the major exportable goods of the country.

WATER SHORTAGE IN EARTHQUAKE STRUCK DISTRICTS

Earthquake survivors are experiencing difficulties in collecting drinking water in the worst-hit districts of central Nepal. Water crisis has forced Kavre farmers to sell their cattle to buy water supplied by tankers. In Kavre, around 600 water supply schemes were damaged by the earthquake, whereas 35 percent sources of water dried up completely in Rasuwa district.

RHINO POACHERS ARRESTED

Other five suspects have been identified which will be charged according to the National Parks and Wildlife Conservation Act, 1973.

THOUSANDS HIT BY FLOOD IN ASSAM

Incessant rains and resultant floods from past few days have affected Sonari, Jorhat, Dibrugarh, Tinsukhia and other parts of upper Assam district. The first wave of floods inundated about 40 villages, affecting over 12,000 people in the district. The water resource department officials and the district disaster management cell are yet to start any surveys in the flood hit areas.

LANDSLIDES KILLS 16 PEOPLE IN ARUNACHAL

A massive landslide, on April 22, killed 16 people at Famla village in Tawang district. A fresh landslide triggered by torrential rain the next day, killed another 2 people and injured four in the same district. Heavy rains in the past couple of days triggered massive landslides and flood-like situation in almost all the districts of the Himalayan State bordering China.

AGRICULTURAL LAND TURNS INTO RESIDENTIAL AREA IN JK

The conversion of agricultural lands in residential area is going unabated across Jammu and Kashmir. As per recent figures, the land has shrunk from 0.14 Ha per person in 1981 to 0.08 in 2001 and further to 0.06 in 2012 and the process is still going on. The High court has given a number of orders to all Deputy Commissioners to implement policies to stop conversion of food producing land into concrete jungle.

TIBET ALLOCATES \$772 MILLION FOR RURAL CONSTRUCTION

Southwest China's Tibet Autonomous Region has spent more than USD 772 million, over the past six years, on improving the region's rural areas. The project that began with 500 villages in 2010 has now been expanded to cover 4,900 villages, almost the entire rural area of the region, according to the region's office for the farmer and herders housing project.

BHUTAN TO PREPARE NEW STRATEGY ON HUMAN WILDLIFE CONFLICT

The agriculture ministry of Bhutan has begun preparing a long-term holistic approach to manage human wildlife conflict in the country. The World Wildlife Fund (WWF) Bhutan trained agriculture, livestock and wildlife officials on an emerging concept, Human Wildlife Safe System Approach. The previous human wildlife strategy developed in 2008 expired in 2013.

FOREST FIRE POSE THREAT TO BHUTAN'S PRISTINE FOREST COVER

The forest department recently revealed that more than 8,000 Ha of forest had been burnt in forest fires within last two months of this year. An estimate of department of forest and park service tells that every year more than 4,000 Ha of forest gets engulfed by fire. Recently, one of the biggest fires ever recorded, burned down hundreds of hectares of forest cover in Jigme Singye Wangchuk National Park.

GOVERNMENT ACQUIRES ADDITIONAL LAND FOR DAM CONSTRUCTION

Around 3,186.89 Ha of additional land has been acquired at the cost of \$450 million for construction of the Diamer-Bhasha Dam. The land acquired for the dam includes a large part of Chilas city, which will be submerged when the dam starts storing water after completion of construction. The dam will produce 4500 MW of electricity, store 10.5 Km³ water for irrigation and drinking and control flood damage downstream upon completion.

RESIDENTS UNSATISFIED WITH THE FLOOD MITIGATION ACTIVITIES

The residents of flood-hit Reshun village in Upper Chitral, Khyber Pokhthunkhwa are unsatisfied with the works going on to mitigate flood in a local stream. Villagers complain that the contractor is not properly clearing the big boulders brought by the recent flood, which might again divert water flow to the area in future. A series of glacial lakes outburst floods (GLOF) played havoc with the village in July and August, last year, rendering over 150 families homeless.
