11 people have died due to monsoon induced landslides in Pyuthan and Gorkha District, western Nepal. The landslide in Pyuthan swept houses killing eight people while three others were buried alive after a mountain slid down where they were working.

FLOOD WREAKS HAVOC IN BHOTEKOSHI RIVER

At least 21 houses were washed away by a flash flood in Tatopani village of Sindhupalchok District. The flood also damaged 45 MW Bhotekoshi Hydropower, under construction 102 MW mid-Bhotekoshi Hydropower plant and 30 km stretch of Tatopani-Lamosangu section, Kodari highway. Likewise, rock fall has obstructed the flow of Tamor River at Sawadin VDC in Taplejung District turning into an artificial lake of about 500 m long and 200 m wide increasing the vulnerability of household alongside.
