#### TRAGEDY STRUCK BY MONSOON

Monsoon triggered landslides and floods have taken the lives of 83 people within three days across the country. Also, hundreds of houses and huge amount of properties have been damaged due to the disaster. Pyuthan district, mid-western Nepal has the highest death toll reaching 37. July 28

#### **RUPA LAKE IN NEED OF CONSERVATION**

Rupa Lake located in the Pokhara valley, western region of Nepal, is in need of conservation as human encroachment and rampant growth of invasive species has threatened its natural beauty. The lake which is also listed in Ramsar list is being degraded by pollution, human interference and uncontrolled spread of water hyacinth. In addition to these, landslides and floods have also played an important part in degrading the quality and beauty of lake by depositing the mud and other particles.

## **DISPOSAL SUGGESTED FOR RARE ANIMAL PARTS**

A total of 3928 animal parts stocked up at Chitwan National Park, Kasara and Armed Forest Guard Training Centre, Tikauli has been recommended by Department of National Park and Wildlife Conservation (DNPWC) for disposal and only 84 parts are suggested for safe storage. The disposal will include 1494 parts of big cats, 881 rhino parts, 708 elephant parts, 13 musk deer parts and 337 parts of other animals. #### POPULATION OF TIGER RISES IN NEPAL

Tiger population in Nepal has increased from 125 in 2010 to 198 in 2013. This increase in number has brought Nepal near to its commitment to double the number of big cats by 2022. The target to increase the number was set to 250 by 2022 in a declaration at International Tiger Conference, St Petersberg, and Russia in 2010. Conservationists believe preservation of community forest, availability of food and control on poaching has helped to increase the tiger population. Meanwhile, tiger population in Bardia National Park, far western Nepal reached 85 and 15 in Shuklaphanta Wildlife Reserve. With optimistic figures, still development works inside protected areas and buffer zones looms large over the sustainability of wild tigers.

# A STEP CLOSER TOWARDS CLEANER RIVER

A total of 24 metric tons of garbage was collected from areas near Bagmati, Bishnumati and Indramati (Dhobikhola) rivers located at Kathmandu. 16 metric tons was collected from Bagmati, 5 metric tons from Bishnumati and 3 metric tons from Indramati river cleanup campaign. The campaigns have been running successively for 168, 103 and 126 weeks respectively in the three river corridors.

#### **RELOCATING 12 ELEPHANTS FOR TIGER PATROLLING**

Karnataka Government and other bodies have issued permission for the relocation of the 12 elephants to Jim Corbett Tiger Reserve to ensure safety of tigers along the southern boundary. The permission has been given by the Karnataka Government, the Zoo Authority of India and the Forest and Environment Ministry with the aim of increasing the number of the tamed pachyderma to be about 18. This is a good initiative to boost patrolling of wild tigers along with vehicular surveillance.
