FEMALE RHINO DIES AT CHITWAN

A female one horned rhino (*Rhinoceros unicornis*) has been found dead in the Bhagaha VDC, Narayani zone, central Nepal. The death of the rhino was suspected to be due to the electric shock received from the electric fence that local people kept for protecting their crops from wild animals. Nevertheless, the horn and hoof of the animal was intact in the body.

TIBETAN ARGALI RE-DISCOVERED AT UPPER DOLPO

Tibetan argali (*Ovisammon hodgsoni*), an endangered, legally protected species has been captured on camera for the first time on July 19, Upper Dolpo at an elevation of 4,796 metres above sea level after more than forty years. Hunting and harsh environmental condition has driven the species to extinction in Dolpo in past. The species is found in China, India and Bhutan as well.

LANDSLIDE DISPLACES HUMAN SETTLEMENTS

Landslides caused by incessant rainfall have displaced eleven households in Itautar and Jirma VDC in Ilam district, eastern Nepal. In Itaura VDC, the land slide has destroyed three houses leaving six houses at risk. Likewise, five families were displaced in Jirma VDC along with seven houses at risk.

RED PANDA HIDES CONFISCATED: 70 IN FOUR YEARS

Nepal Police has confiscated nine red panda (*Ailurus fulgens*) skins from Kapan, Kathmandu, central Nepal last week. According to the Law Enforcement Agency, in the last four years altogether 70 units of red pandas hide have been seized. Red pandas are in the decreasing number due to poaching and habitat destruction. Aug 13

BAT POPULATION DECREASES IN THE VALLEY

Population of bats residing in Kathmandu valley has drastically decreased one of these days. Rapid urbanization, electrocution, lack of fruit farms and felling of trees have attributed to the death of at least 600 bats in the period of nine years. Kesarmahal and Narayanhiti palace premises in Kathmandu valley and Sallaghari in Bhaktapur are the major habitats of bats.

GOVERNMENT INSTALLS EARLY WARNING SYSTEM

The Department of Hydrology and Meteorology has installed 42 early warning system to inform public about the possible danger of landslides and inundation beforehand. The radar installed at the bank of river provides information regarding the water level which can send warning ranges from mountain to hilly region.

DEATH TOLL OF RHINO REACHES TO 49 IN ASSAM

Assam, the north eastern part of India has lost 49 Rhinos since May this year in four different national parks. Out of total number, 22 rhinos were killed in natural calamity and 21 died naturally across Kaziranga , Manas ans Pobitora forest area. Five rhinos were poached in Kaziranga National Park and one rhino was poached in Orang National Park. Though, 49 rhinos died, the forest officer recovered only 19 rhino horns. Aug 11

WHITE RUMPED SWIFT SPOTTED FOR THE FIRST TIME IN LHALU WETLANDS

The researchers of Tibet has spotted the white rumped swift (*Apus caffer*) and four species of butterfly in the Lhalu Wetland, China's highest altitude wetland at 3600 meters for the first time. The number of wetland plant and animal species has been increasing yearly with improvement in ecological environment of lake. Lhalu Lake has an area of 12.64km², where the average water level has risen by three centimeters.
