Headlines Himalaya

Nov 14 - Nov 20

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For the 430th issue of Headlines Himalaya, we reviewed 17 news from 11 sources and selected 16 happenings from five countries. In Nepal, for enhancing the agricultural productivity, and making country self-sufficient in the food sector, the government of Nepal has implemented a US\$ 1.2 billion Prime Minister Agriculture Modernization Project. Over a ton of black rice has been successfully produced by a farmer in Sindupalchok, central Nepal. In India, annual camera traps installation exercise has started in Pakke Tiger Reserve, northern India to track wildlife activities. In China, the connectivity of Tibet Autonomous Region (TAR) is strengthening with construction of railways, roads and airports facilitating socio-economic status of TAR. In Bhutan, an awareness campaign on forest fire management has been organized by forest officials in schools and communities of Wandue and Punakha, central Bhutan as these regions have witnessed several fire incidents recently.

INITIATION BY GOVERNMENT FOR FARM MODERNIZATION

In order to enhance agricultural productivity, and make the country self-sufficient in the food sector, the government of Nepal has implemented a US\$ 1.2 billion Prime Minister Agriculture Modernization Project, which envisions new and modern agricultural techniques. The responsibilities of the implementation of project's programmes will be carried out by Central Management Unit (CMU), set up in Harihar Bhawan, Lalitpur, central Nepal. The project will be launched with 10-year scheme in the next two weeks and will hold 317 staffs. The government has planned to create 2100 pocket areas (10 ha each), 150 blocks (100 ha each), 30 zones (500 ha each) and also seven super zones (1000 ha each) to be promoted for different products across the nation. FIRST BLACK RICE PRODUCTION IN SINDHUPALCHOK

A local farmer from Sindhupalchok, Central Nepal, has successfully produced over a ton of black rice (*Oryza sps*). Black rice has high nutritional value and is usually grown 1500-1800 m above the sea level. The production of black rice in Nepal was initiated in the Dang district, Western Nepal about five years ago.

FIVE CLINICS SEALED

Five clinics in Kathmandu and Lalitpur districts, Central Nepal, were sealed by Health Ministry as they were found to be in operation without meeting the government's Guideline for Health Institution Establishment, Operation and Upgrade Standard-2070 BS. A total of seventeen clinics were monitored out of which five were sealed.

DENGUE IN CHITWAN AND RUPANDEHI

According to the District Public Health Office, 653 dengue cases with two deaths have been recorded in last three months in Chitwan, Central Nepal and a total of 36 people in Rupandehi, Western Nepal, have been infected with this virus. The patients are receiving medical treatment and the rest of the uninfected are receiving awareness programs. Due to the infectious disease, Dengue, caused by mosquitoes of genus *Aedes Aegypti*, five people had succumbed to death in 2010.

SMART METER TO CONTROL POWER LEAKAGE

Nepal Electricity Authority (NEA) is installing smart meters in the Kathmandu valley, Central Nepal, as a pilot project to control power leakages. This project also focuses on controlling the electricity theft across the country and also the smart meter installation will allow the customers to pay electricity bills through cell phones. According to NEA data, 100 MW out of 890 MW in the NEA central grid, is wasted due to theft and leakages. Nov 17

SCRUB TYPHUS IN KAILALI

Out of 113 cases of Scrub typhus, four people have died in Kailali district, far western Nepal, in the last four months. According to District Public Health Office (DPHO), out of 58 diagnosed with the disease, two were succumbed to death last year. Humans are known to acquire this disease from the bite of the infected mites (*Trombiculidae*). Despite the multiple casualties, very few steps have been taken to mitigate the effects. Nov 20

WILDLIFE TRACKING IN PAKKE TIGER RESERVE

Annual Camera traps installation exercise has been started in Pakke Tiger Reserve, the most consistent Tiger Reserve in Kameng district of Arunachal Pradesh of northeast India, for tracking wildlife activities. Camera trapping technique was started by researchers of Wildlife Institute of India (WII) in 2006 for the first time in the tiger reserve. The entire reserve with the division into two blocks- Tippi and Seijosa, will carry out this whole camera traps exercise for around five months.

UNEXAMINED CHICKENS IN MARKET

The possibilities of infected chickens in the market have been increased with the import of 55 million unexamined chickens by Kashmir, northern India, significantly risking the consumers' health. Poultry farming is booming in that region but health experts have apprised that the epidemic can break at any instant as they lack the health officers who could regularly inspect the market and farms. As more than 60 diseases are associated with poultry, experts suggest government to take measures for enhancing safe poultry practice.

WORLD BANK-FUNDED FLOOD RECONSTRUCTION PROGRAM

The Indian Government has executed the first phase of World Bank-funded flood reconstruction programme worth US\$ 32128536 for reconstruction of several bridges, major roads and other infrastructures in Srinagar, northern India. The Indian Government under ambitious US\$ 250 million World Bank-funded flood reconstruction programme would be using US\$ 140 million for reconstructing and strengthening critical flood-hit infrastructures including roads and bridges, US\$ 50 million for restoring urban flood management infrastructure and so on.

HEAVY METALS DETECTED IN THE WATER OF HOLY RIVER

According to the National Green Tribunal (NGT), Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB) has reported the presence of 14 heavy metals and pesticides in the water of Holy River Ganga between Haridwar and Kanpur,

Uttar Pradesh, Northern India. Those 14 heavy metals detected in the water of Holy River Ganga included arsenic, cadmium, lead, nickel, chromium, cobalt and selenium, deteriorating its water quality.

Though having a joint operation with wildlife NGOs and the Assam Forest Department for joint trans-boundary management in a few areas, Bhutan expresses the need of strong measures to expand the collaboration and manage the conflicts.
