SMUGGLERS FACE 10 YEARS IMPRISONMENT

The District Court of Dhading, central Nepal, has pronounced 10 years prison sentence along with the fine of NPR 60,000 to five men involved in smuggling of endangered Tibetan Antelope (*Pantholops hodgsonii*) for its wool. The smugglers were filed a case when the Central Investigation Bureau (CIB) retrieved huge amount of Tibetan Antelope's wool in 2013.

AIR QUALITY MONITORING STATIONS START FUNCTIONING

Department of Environment has started operating three air quality monitoring stations in Ratnapark, Pulchowk and Dhulikhel, central Nepal, this week. Concentration of four types of air pollutant gases; $CO_{2,}$ SO_{2} , NO and O_{3} and computing dust particles in PM10, PM 2.5 and PM1, wind speed, wind direction, air temperature and relative humidity are measured. ONLY 8 TUINS REPLACED BY SUSPENSION BRIDGES

The government's statement to replace all the 171 dangerous Tuins (traditional wire river crossings) around the country with safer and more durable suspension bridges is proceeding at a snail's pace. Only 8 Tuins have been replaced in six districts since October 2015.

CHILDREN TERRIFIED TO GO TO SCHOOL

Children living near the buffer zone of Bardiya National Park, mid-west Nepal, have been frightened to go to school, after a student was killed by a wild elephant (*Elephas maximus*) last month. Locals have already been demanding electric fence installation to the National Park. There are about 50 children near the buffer zone who use the forest route to go to school every day.

CHILDREN SUFFERING FROM MALNUTRITION IN BAJHANG

Above 15% of children below the age of 5 in Bajhang district, far western Nepal, are under the grip of malnutrition as shown by a study conducted by District Health Office. Among 2796 children, 410 were diagnosed as malnourished. Of them, 112 children were found with severe malnutrition condition while, 298 others suffered from mild malnutrition. There are approximately 22,000 children under the age of five in Bajhang. Dec 1

ELEPHANT ATTACKS CLAIMED 35 LIVES IN LAST 17 YEARS

A report disclosed by Bardiya National Park, mid-west Nepal, revealed that at least 35 people have lost their lives in separate elephant (*Elephas maximus*) attacks from Bardiya in past 17 years. The government of Nepal has already provided monetary relief of NPR 25,000 to NPR 100,000 to the affected families.

INADEQUATE RAIN TROUBLE FARMERS IN HIMANCHAL PRADESH

Farmers in Himanchal Pradesh, northern India, are worried about the wheat production due to deficit in rainfall. As reported by weather bureau, rainfall deficit was 100% from Oct 1 to Nov 26 with the cumulative rainfall just at 5.3 mm which was 91% less than the normal precipitation (56.3 mm) and this dry condition is forecasted to continue till December 2. The target of 16 lakh tonnes of food production of the state agriculture department has been badly threatened by climate change.

Though the forest department had already set up three cages to trap the leopard, it is still at large.

GYATSO WINS WILDLIFE SERVICE AWARD

Lobsang Gyatso, widely known as 'Anna Lama' has bagged the prestigious Wildlife Service Award of the Santuary Wildlife Awards, 2016. Nyamjang Chhu river of Mon Tawang, north-western part of Arunachal Pradesh in India is recognized as one of the only two sites in India for black-necked crane (*Grus nigricollis*). Gyatso with his Save Moon Region Federation (SMRF) successfully stopped the 780-MW Nyamjung Chhu river hydel project because of its environmental impact in the Tawang region.

E-COMMERCE FOR CORDYCEPS IN TIBET

The first ever e-commerce platform for trading *Cordyceps* has been launched by the Tibet Commodity Trading Center that primarily focuses on linking the customers directly to the sale stores thereby, minimizing the steps in-between, cost along with stabilizing and promoting industrial growth. Tibet being the main production site for *Cordyceps* (a rare, non-renewable and essential Chinese medicinal herb), accounts for 30% of annual national output. The model of "Internet + Cordyceps" could also be used for other Tibetan specialty products.

FARMERS IN CHUKHA PREPARE FOR GOOD HAZELNUT YIELD

Hazel tree (Corylus) cultivators in Chukha, western Bhutan, are expecting a pleasant harvest as the plants are doing very well. One of the hopeful farmers said he has planted 3500 hazelnut samplings on 18 acres of land and

is expecting a profitable outcome while some farmers are planning to shift to kiwifruit (*Actinidia deliciosa*) cultivation due to other concerns. The hazelnut venture that started in 2011 is expected to plant 10 million hazelnut trees in next five years.

VITAMIN AND MINERAL DEFICIENT WOMEN AND CHILDREN
