SWEPT BY FLOOD, FOUND ALIVE IN SUSTA

Two one-horned rhinos (*Rhinoceros unicornis*), carried away by the recent floods have been found alive in the Chandragunj of Susta Rural Municipality-5, Nawalparasi, western Nepal. The rhinos were washed away by the rising water levels of the Narayani River at the Chitwan National Park, south central Nepal.

SCRUB TYPHUS TAKES A LIFE

A woman has died in Chitwan, south central Nepal due to Scrub typhus after she was admitted to the Bharatpurbased Central Hospital, while 133 new cases have been lodged for the same disease. According to the doctors, if this infectious mite-borne disease goes undetected and untreated, it can cause death of the affected person. The symptoms of the deadly disease include fever, measles and rashes.

REAL TIME MONITORING IN CORBETT TIGER RESERVE

Corbett Tiger Reserve in Nainital, northern India, has launched an intranet project for real-time monitoring of activities inside the reserve. The project allows for live-streaming of footages from cameras installed in the reserve and facilitates the staffs to access those footages even from their smart phones. This initiative is regarded to be a boon for Tiger (*Panthera tigris*) conservation in this reserve, as it has been witnessing several poaching incidents.

RARE TURTLE FOUND DEAD

A giant turtle was spotted dead on the bank of Tasek Lake, in Garo Hills of Meghalaya, north eastern India. Such turtle was found for the first time in this area, but has not been documented, says a veterinarian. However, it is suspected to be *Nilssonia hurum* or *Nilssonia nigricans* species that are listed under Red List category of IUCN.

CONIFER TRANSPLANTATION FOR THE FIRST TIME IN INDIA

Forest department of Kullu district of Himachal Pradesh, northern India, has started transplanting trees, especially deodar (*Cedrus deodara*) to adjoining strips of Kullu-Manali National Highway. This initiative was undertaken for conserving around 5000 trees of different species that were marked to be chopped down for broadening of National Highway. According to District Forest Officer, conifer transplantation was done for the first time in India.

BAN ON POLYTHENE, STILL UNDERMINED

Despite the imposition of ban on polythene bags twice in Jammu and Kashmir of northern India, the government has failed to strictly implement it. The decision was made by Forest Department on June 18, 2008 and 3rd April 2017. However, the menace of polythene is still plaguing the state, posing severe threat of environment and health hazards.

BOVINE SMUGGLING: A MAJOR ISSUE

Bovine smuggling to Bangladesh has become a major concern, as records revealed that more than 12.2 million cattle were seized in the last 2.5 years by Border Security Force in areas under Guwahati frontier, north eastern India. Similar case was observed in Jammu and Kashmir, northern India, where smuggling of more than 45 bovines

from Doha and Udhampur districts of Jammu and Kashmir, to valley was attempted by three people who were then arrested in August 28.

LANDSLIDE IN SHIMLA

A major landslide in Chandigarh- Shimla highway in Himachal, northern India, has buried many vehicles, destroyed three houses and a temple on 2nd September. However, no casualty was reported. But the vehicular movement on highway has been obstructed, leaving hundreds of vehicles stranded on the road. This year, due to cloudbursts, northern part of country has been suffering from several adversities.

TIGER UNDER BIGGEST THREAT

Poaching still remains a major threat to tigers (*Panthera tigris*) in India, as cases of poaching and smuggling of body parts have risen by 63% in the last few years (2014-2016). Government even spent USD 2,342,739,862.2 on the conservation of these cats but failed to fight against poachers. Despite making various efforts to combat poaching, India is still battling for tiger conservation.

TIBETAN HERDERS PRESERVING ANTELOPES

Herders are preserving protected Antelope (*Pantholops hodgsoni*) in Changtang grassland of northern Tibet. Around 300 antelopes have been staying in this grassland since 1997, which is rare to see, as stated by a villager. Herders leaving grasses to feed for them, sealing off the grassland against grazing at suitable time, good ecoenvironment, scanty predators, and patrolling by villagers have led the conservation of antelopes in this region. Government statistics show an increase of around 160,000 Tibetan Antelopes from 40,000 in the past 20 years.

RISE IN TIBETAN MACAQUES

Population of Tibetan Macaques (*Macaca thibetana*) continue to rise in the ecological reserve at Gongbo' gyamda County of southwest China's Tibet Autonomous Region. Its current count stands at 2,800. Continual contribution of Dobrgyal, who is a forest keeper and the only breeder for the last 16 years, is credited for this increase.

RARE FISH TAGGED AND RELEASED

For the first time in Tibet, fish have been tagged and released into the river. Around 470 tagged native fishes were released, that contained three rare species related to Carp (*Cyprinus carpio*). The objective behind this is to protect and monitor population density of these rare species and assess the effect of artificial breeding in restocking fish numbers in Lasha River.

DENGUE CRISIS AREAS DECLARED RED ZONE

Dengue affected areas in Peshawar, north western Pakistan, have been declared as red zone since dengue epidemic still continue to rise, causing massive health crisis. So far, dengue outbreak has infected 3,931 people in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa while death toll reached 13. Experts blame old tyres for serving as breeding ground for mosquitoes. Efforts are underway for eradication of dengue virus.
