NEPAL New concept for irrigation

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NEW CONCEPT FOR IRRIGATION

People of Banskharka, Myagdi, western Nepal has started a new concept for irrigation facility along with the use of quality fertilizer for orange (*Citrus* sp.) production. Farmers have made 10 plastic ponds having a capacity of 10,000 litres in order to collect water which can later be used for irrigating the farms. Although, farmers have been earning more than NPR 20 million per year from orange production, which proves to be a good income, but lack of irrigation facility during dry season has pose difficulties for the continuity of the production.

SIX DUCK SPECIES LOST

According to recent census, six species of duck have been lost from Chitwan Wetlands, south central Nepal. As per the bird census that was conducted by the Chitwan National Park and Bird Education Society the number of birds inhabiting the wetlands is 5,576 and the number of birds inhabiting other areas is 6,215. Among 54 species recorded last year, only 48 duck species were found this year. They recorded 213 types of water birds living in and around the wetland areas of Chitwan. The duck species such as (Sindurey Hans, Phurkey Hans, Hari Hans, Sunchuri Hans, Soiro Puchchharey Hans and the Swtaankhibhaun Hans) were not found in the district.

BIO GAS POWER PLANT IN SYANGJA

The first bio-gas power plant has been operated in Syangja, western Nepal investing around NPR 500 million in an area of about 2.03 hectare. The plant designed in order to replace the solid excreta and to manage the energy for the plant has been producing one tonnes of gas, 350 kW of electricity and 15 tonnes of biological sewage per day.

INCORRECT USE OF HERBS

Unaware of the importance of herbs, the farmers in the various parts of Gulmi, western Nepal have been using these valuable herbs in the forms of woods and grasses. More than three community forests, Bharsey, Madonna, Thapley, Resunga and Salime have precious and multi-herbal herbs like Sugandhawal (*Polianthes tuberosa*), Jatamasi (*Nardostachys jatamansi*), Kutaki (*Neopicrorhiza scrophulariifolia*), Dalchini (*Cinnamomum verum*), Chiraito (*Swertia chirayita*), Kurilo (*Asparagus racemosus*), Lokta (*Danphe panachea*), Timur (*Zanthoxylum armatum*), Amala (*Phyllanthus emblica*), Bell (*Aegle marmelos*), Tejpat (*Cinnamomum tamala*) and many more but they have been decaying in the forest. According to the officials, at past, Sugandhawal, Timur, Kurilo, and fruits of Sugandha were sold at NPR 240, NPR 800, NPR 120 and NPR 250 respectively, but at present these have been used for feeding animals and burning woods only.

DEVELOPMENT OF DISEASE RESISTANCE POTATO

Nepal Agricultural Research Council (NAR) has developed new embroidery potato (*Solaneum tuberosum*) for the first time by crossing into a new species. The program has distributed 10 species of potatoes to the farmer so that, farmers can take a good income by planting them, according to the climatic condition. The program has sent new seeds to seed quality level checkpoints.

INCREASED IN APPLE PRODUCTION

Transportation linkage in Jumla, far western Nepal has satisfied and encouraged farmers with a good income in the district which has increased the apple (*Malus* sps.) production by 15 percent. Among, 18 thousand houses, 16 thousand have benefitted from apple cultivation by exporting NPR 160 million of apples in the places like Surkhet, Nepalguni, mid western Nepal, Biratnagar, eastern Nepal and Kathmandu, central Nepal.

SUDDEN WEATHER CHANGED DISRUPTING THE LIVELIHOODS

Sudden weather change due to the westerly winds, in the central and western mountainous regions of Nepal has resulted in a moderate rain and snowfall and thus, affecting the normal life across the country. According to the Meteorological Forecasting Division (MFD) under the Department of Hydrology and Meteorology (DHM), Dadeldhura, far western Nepal have witnessed the heaviest rainfall of 12 mm and Bhairahawa, western Nepal have a record of 6 mm rainfall, while Kathmandu, central Nepal has received 2 mm rainfall along with the lowest temperature of 7.3 degree Celsius.

CHITWAN NATIONAL PARK TAKES A LEAP OF ACTION FOR RARE SPECIES

Chitwan National Park, south central Nepal has succeeded in conserving different rare species by reducing poaching of animals to zero and improving its internal management. According to the park authorities, greatest feats such as transfer of rhinos (*Rhinoceros unicornis*), wild buffaloes (*Bubalus arnee*) and musk deer (*Moschus leucogaster*) to the park, rescue of tigers (*Panthera tigris tigris*) and rhinos, rehabilitation of a male gharial (*Gavialis gangeticus*) and management of grasslands has been achieved. The various conservational activities such transferred of five rhinos to Shuklaphanta National Park, captivation of endangered vulture species (*Gyps himalayensis*) in vulture breeding centre and release to the wild are few of the examples in order to prove its achievements in conserving wild species.

GARLIC PRICE SOARED IN SOLUKHUMBU

FOREST LAND ENCROACHED IN JHAPA

Ratuwamai Tree Plantation Project, Jhapa, eastern Nepal has been facing huge land encroachment in a recent period.
