IMPROVEMENT IN HEALTH CONDITION OF TERAI ELEPHANT

According to the senior veterinarian, the occurrence of tuberculosis (TB) in elephants (*Elephus maximus*) of Chitwan National Parkand Parsa National Park, south central Nepal has declined as compared to the last year. Domesticated elephants are affected by TB after being in close contact with humans. According to National Trust for Nature Conservation (NTNC), 15 elephants died due to TB up to 2014. Early identification and treatment of infected domestic elephants will help in elimination of spread of TB to wild elephants.

ILLEGAL LOGS SEIZED

Illegal logs of Khangra (*Dipterocarpus tuberculatus*), Teak (*Tectona grandis*) and Yangou (*Dipterocarpus turbinatus*) worth around USD 1.6 million has been sized from Kamjong district in Manipur north eastern India.
