EMBANKMENT CONSTRUCTED

An embankment has been constructed at Amar Community forest of Kanchanpur District, far western Nepal to overcome destruction caused by enlarged rivulets. The embankment is 1,000 meters in length along the Trishuli and Rautela rivulets with cost construction of NPR 6 million collected by the forest from the sale of wood, fodder and gravels. The construction of this embankment has secured more than 150 families as per the Chairperson of Amar Community Forest.

The flood, result of heavy rain at Jhupra River in Nalgad Municipality of Jajarkot, far western Nepal has caused massive destruction of developmental infrastructures and private properties while hundreds of families have been displaced. A bridge has also been swept by the flood.

DECLINE IN RHINO POPULATIONS

Last year, the death toll of rhinos (*Rhinoceros unicornis*) reached 26 owing to natural causes. As per the Regional Director of Forests, four died due to flood, 12 due to old age and 10 due to clash among themselves. Rhino attack has caused more deaths of people than any other wildlife. Recently, one rhino was found dead near lake at Chitwan National Park (CNP), south central Nepal and according to veterinary doctor, rhino might have died due to old age. According to Information Officer of CNP, this is the first natural death of rhino reported this fiscal year and declining population of rhinos due to natural causes requires in-depth research as emphasized by the conservationists.

JUVENILE WATER BUFFALO AT CNP

A wild water buffalo (*Bubalus arnee*), listed as an endangered mammal in Protected Species of Nepal, has given birth to female calf at Chitwan National Park (CNP), south, Central Nepal. With the birth of this calf, buffalo population has reached ten in CNP. Fifteen wild water buffaloes were relocated to CNP from Koshi Tappu Wildlife Reserve, eastern Nepal and Central Zoo, central Nepal two years ago. Some survived in the new environment while some failed to adapt and died.

PEOPLE CAUGHT RED HANDED

A group of five people were caught red handed with raw meat of deer (*Axis spp.*) and weapons from Sarlahi district, eastern Nepal by Sector Forest Officers. Culprits will be punished according to Wildlife Conservation Act. Poaching is prevalent more these days as wildlife encounter with humans has increased due to wildfire in dry season and habitat encroachment.

COMPLETION OF KALANKI UNDERPASS

Construction work of underpass at Kalanki chowk, central Nepal which connects Khasibazaar with Bafal chowk has been completed. This 800-meter long underpass will come into operation soon. With the completion of this four-lane underpass, traffic congestion at Kalanki chowk is expected to ease. Due to earthquake 2015 and India's trade embargo this project was delayed.

FIRST HARVEST OF HIGH DENSITY APPLES

The Governor of Jammu and Kashmir, northern India has inaugurated the "First Harvest of High Density Plantation of Apples (*Malus* spp.)" by plucking fruits from different varieties of plant at Sher-e-Kashmir University of Agricultural Sciences and Technology (SKUAST-K) Orchard, northern India on Aug 12. The Vice Chancellor of the university has urged the farmers to take help from the university's scientist and experts for the introduction of new High-density Apples in order to achieve higher yield in the years to come.

HEAVY RAINFALL CAUSES CHAOS IN HIMACHAL

Due to the heavy rainfall and landslide, about 400 roads and three National Highways: Hindustan-Tibet, Chandigarh-Manali and Pathankot-Chamba have been closed in Himachal Pradesh, northern India. According to the District Administration, a bridge and four irrigation canals have been completely damaged by the flash flood in Cherang nalah. As a result, more than 100 tourists are stuck in Sangla. Similarly, Kullu and Rampur of Himachal Pradesh have been heavily affected due to heavy rain damaging public and private propreties. The District Administration has also warned the locals about the water level rise in Larji dam in Kullu district and asked them to be careful.

SEVERE IMPACTS OF POLLUTION

According to the document published by Ecology and Environment Department, the water bodies and Saffron (*Crocus sativus*) cultivation have been greatly affected by increasing pollution in Jammu and Kashmir, northern India in addition to the impact on nearby forests and wildlife. Due to rapid industrialization and mining activities, the incidence of cancer and respiratory health problems have increased among the residents. The forest resources are also under overwhelming pressure due to changing land-use patterns, forest degradation and development of infrastructures giving rise to additional environmental problems.

The Annual Sho Dun commonly known as Yogurt festival has started in Lhasa, south western China at Deprung and Sera monasteries on Aug 11 by unrolling thangka, a giant religious silk painting. This festival was originated in 11th century when pious folks were served with Yogurt on their very last day stay in mountain hermitages for penance. In 2006, this was included in the National intangible cultural heritage.. A week-long celebration this year includes activities such as Tibetan opera performances, horse races, an ethnic costume show, hiking and a trade fair.

ELEPHANT NUMBER MULTIPLIES IN BHUTAN

According to the second edition of National Elephant Survey Report launched on World Elephant Day, Aug 12, there is an increase of 165 (*Elephas maximus*) reaching 678 than the survey in 2011 in Bhutan. With the increase in number of elephants, the human-wildlife conflict has also increased in the southern region of the country where the elephants inhabit. The World Wildlife Fund (WWF) has adopted a SAFE system to resolve the human-wildlife conflict and the Chief Forestry Officer of the Nature Conservation Division of the Department of Parks and Services mentioned that maintenance of continuous forest cover and balance between conservation and development are of utmost importance in Bhutan for elephant conservation.

PROMOTION OF BAMBOO FOR HOUSING AND CONSTRUCTION

The South Asian Bamboo Foundation (SABF) in collaboration with the Handicrafts Association of Bhutan (HAB) and the Bhutan Chamber of Commerce and Industry (BCCI) has launched an application called "Bamtech" to promote the use of bamboo (Bambuseae spp.) in housing and constructions instead of timber on Aug 14 in Thimpu, west central Bhutan. This app provides information and awareness to the people about different species of bamboo grown in the country. According to the Founder and Executive Director of the SABF, around 36 species of bamboo are grown in Bhutan.

BENEFITS FROM CONSTRUCTION OF HIGHWAY

The widening and blacktopping of 37 km Tingtibi-Gongphu Highway, southern Bhutan completed in June has made the transportation easier and faster by reducing the travel time between the two places by two hours. According to the locals, the turnings of the road have been damaged but the condition is far better than past. The officials of Department of Roads (DoR) have been monitoring for the compliance with the quality specifications made in the contract.

YOUNG YAK-KILLING DISEASE IN BHUTAN

The people in Gasa district, northern Bhutan have been losing their young yaks (*Bos grunniens*) due to Gid disease every year. The disease directly affects the central nervous system of yaks and sheep (*Ovis aries*) caused by the larvae of a tapeworm, *Taenia multiceps* known as *Coenurus cerebralis* present in the faeces of dogs (*Canis lupus familiaris*) which is consumed by the yak while grazing. Over 9,500 yaks have died due to Gid during the past 15 years. The livestock extension office of Lunana have been raising awareness about vaccinating calves on time and de-worming of dogs.

PLANTATION CAMPAIGN IN KHYBER PAKHTUNKHWA

With the aim to reduce the effect of climate change, the administration has launched tree plantation campaign in Mohmand district in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, north western Pakistan on Aug 13. The condition of Mohmand is found to be suitable for pine (*Pinus* spp.) plantation and 130,000 saplings are decided to be planted during this campaign. Similarly, on the occasion of 71st Independence Day of Pakistan, Sustainable Forest Management Project and Forest Department of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, north western Pakistan have planted 25,000 saplings in one hour at different areas of Kaghan valley in Hazara division on Aug 14 making it a record. About 22,000 students from different schools actively participated in the plantation program.
