For the 548th issue of Headlines Himalaya, we reviewed 48 news from 20 sources and 41 selected happenings from five countries.

Sixty seven security personnel have been trained for disaster risks reduction and rescue operations in Bhaktapur, central Nepal. A human settlement along the bank of Karnali river and a bridge are at risk due to diversion of the river in far western Nepal. CROCODILES TRAPPED IN FISHING NET

Seven gharials (*Gavialis gangeticus*) have been found dead in the Rapti river, Chitwan National Park, South-central Nepal in this fiscal year. According to the chief conservation officer, another 7 gharials have been rescued from the illegally trapping in fishing net. People have been using net illegally for fishing which also trap the gharials. He also informed that by 2018 survey, there were 219 gharials in CNP and surrounding areas.

HUNTING PERMIT IN DHORPATAN

Dhorpatan Hunting Reserve, Baglung, Western Nepal has granted permission to hunt 10 naurs also called Himalayan blue sheep (*Pseudoisnayaur*) and 4 jharals (*Hemitragusjemlahicus*) in the second season of this fiscal year. Department of National Park and wildlife conservation has selected 5 companies to hunting. There are 7 hunting blocks in Dhorpatan and the selected companies would be given separate blocks for hunting. The hunting companies have to pay NPR 1,351,000 and NPR 1,350,000 for each of Naur and Jharal.

BIRD-FLU PREVENTION DRIVE IN HETAUDA

More than 10,000 fowls has been slaughtered from 8 poultry farms and buried in safe place in Hetauda, Central Nepal. Authorities are planning to slaughter additional 41,500 chickens in the area. A team of veterinarians has been deployed in affected areas and their vicinity to suspect and control the spread. CDO has decided to slaughter

poultry in the metropolis to prevent possible outbreak of H_5N_1 influenza virus and to compensate the farmers. High alert has been maintained in Chitwan, Central Nepal following the menifestation of bird flu in the neighbouring Makwanpur district.

SHUANGHU, SAFE HEAVEN FOR WILDLIFE

Shuanghu county, located 5,000 m above sea level in Tibet, southwest China, is home to the world's third largest glacier, the Purog Kangri. Wild animals such as kiangs (*Equus kiang*), Tibetan antelopes (*Pantholops hodgsonii*) and yaks (*Bosgrunniens*) wandering on meadows at the foot of snow mountains can be found. There are 135 conservation staff members working in Shuanghu's 15 wildlife management and conservation stations to improve protection of wild animals. In 2018, the county government suspended construction of tourism-related support facilities around the Purog Kangri glacier to better protect the environment.

BUILDING NATIONAL PARKS

China plans to build five national parks in the Tibet region, southwest China as the part of the nation's growing effort to protect the environment while improving locals' livelihoods by boosting ecotourism on the Qinghai Tibetan Plateau. According to director of the Qinghai-Tibet Plateau Institute of the Chinese Academy of Sciences, five locations encompass areas around Qomolangma, Bome and Medog counties, the Zanda Earth Forest in western Tibet, the Changtang Plateau, and Serling Tso, which is Tibet's largest lake.

TREE AGE TO RECORD GLACIER CHANGES

Chinese researchers have managed to use tree ages to accurately record glacier changes that happened centuries ago in the Qinghai-Tibet Plateau. The professor of the Institute of Tibetan Plateau Research of the Chinese Academy of Sciences, looks for clues on the glacier fore fields, the landscape formed by retreating glaciers and conducted research based on the use of historical pictures and field surveys of trees on 10 glacial deposits and fore fields in the southern and western plateau regions in China, Nepal and Pakistan from 2013-2017.
