MOBILIZATION OF CLIMATE CHANGE FUNDS

Ministry of Forests and Environment has started collecting the views of the concerned stakeholders on the climate change policy draft. Nepal has already become a signatory nation in the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC), Kyoto Protocol and Sustainable Development Goals.

MINOR EARTHQUAKES RECORDED

An earthquake of 4.1 Richter scale has been measured in Kathmandu, central Nepal at around 9 am with its epicenter at Chitlang, Makwanpur, central Nepal. According to National Seismological Centre it was an aftershock of great Gorkha Earthquake and since then over 514 tremors had been struck above 4 magnitude making epicenter at western Nepal. Meanwhile, earthquakes of 3.8 and 3 Richter scale intensity has been measured in Baitadi and Darchula, western Nepal next day at 6:28 pm and 7:42 pm respectively.

BIRD FLU OUTBREAKS IN CENTRAL NEPAL

After detection of Bird flu in Kathmandu, central Nepal, about 28,000 hens have been slaughtered in two poultry farms of Tarkeshwor Municipality-7 and furthermore, the disinfectant has being sprayed in the affected poultry farms. 123,034 hens have been slaughtered in Kathmandu and Makwanpur district, central Nepal after bird flu, also known as H_5N_1 influenza virus was detected.

MERCURY FREE METROPOLITAN BHARATPUR

Bharatpur Metropolitan City, Chitwan, south-central Nepal has been declared mercury free city after stopping use of products containing mercury in dental clinics and other health facilities of the city. The campaign for mecury free city was initiated by Centre for Public Health and Environmental Development (CEPHED). Mercury is a hazardous substance that cannot be eliminated from the body and may amplify the genetic damage of the offspring. Mercury can damage the heart and kidney as well as neuro, reproductive, digestive and respiratory system of a human body. The dental hospitals and clinics have switched to digital thermometers and android blood pressure monitors from mercury based devices.

YAKS DIE IN AVALANCHE

Seventeen Yaks (*Bus grunniens*) have died in severe avalanche in Shorunga, Karmaronga Rural Municipality-6, of Mugu district in mid-western Nepal with a loss of worth NPR 1,360,000. The yaks were caught in avalanche while grazing in the pasture. According to the owner, Himali Project had supported him to rear the yaks.

SOLAR-POWERED 'SMART' DUSTBINS IN KATHMANDU

Kathmandu Metropolitan City, Kathmandu, central Nepal has installed 60 'smart' dustbins worth NPR 600,000 each around the metropolis. However, the KMC officials have admitted that the number of installed dustbins were insufficient for waste collection in a city that produces 500 tons of waste every day. The smart dustbins have mobile phone charging slots and display temperature and air pollution level.

SNOW LEOPARD KILLS CATTLES IN DOLPA

10 cattles including 4 goats (*Capra aegagrushircus*) and 6 sheeps (*Ovisaries*) have been killed by snow leopard (*Panthera uncia*) in Thuli Bheri Municipality-2, Dolpa, mid-western Nepal in the shed. The officer said that this was the first attack by a snow leopard in this fiscal year. According to the Division Forest Office, process is underway to provide compensation to the victim.

RHINO FOUND DEAD IN SEPTIC TANK

A female rhino (*Rhinoceros unicornis*), was found dead due to suffocation in septic tank of a hotel of Jagatpur, Bharatpur Metropolitan City-23, Chitwan, central Nepal. The hotel is adjacent to CNP and the cover of the tank was easily breakable. It was the same rhino which was rescued from Susta around 6 months back.

RELIEF AID PROVIDED BY LANGTANG NP

On the occasion of 43rd year of its establishment, Langtang National Park, Rasuwa, central Nepal has provided relief aid of NPR 10,000 to 10 people for crop damages caused by wildlife. Earlier the park had provided relief aid to 21 people as a compensation for wildlife damages. The people mostly complained about the wild boar (*Sus scrofa*) causing damage to their crops. According to the chief conservation officer of the park, the compensation was provided as per the wildlife damage relief guideline 2069.

VILLAGERS REFUSE REOPENING OF GARBAGE PLANT

Dumping of municipal waste has become a major problem in Palampur, Himachal Pradesh, Northern India. FLORICULTURE IN HIMACHAL PRDESH

CONTINUOUS RAINFALL AND SNOW IN SRINAGAR

AIR QUALITY WORSENS IN JAMMU, SRINAGAR

Air pollution has exceeded the permissible limit in Jammu and Srinagar, Northern India because of unplanned urbanization and uncontrolled vehicular growth on the roads. Both the cities have breached the established air quality norms about five years ago with suspended particulate matter and respiratory suspended particulate matter crossing the threshold levels. The State Pollution Control Board (SPCB) is now imposing a ban on the use of firewood and coal by restaurants and dhabas (eateries).

WATER SUPPLY PROJECT IN GUWAHATI

An official in the Guwahati Metropolitan Drinking Water and Sewerage Board said around 150 connections have been given in the Pandu area and some 70 in the Happy Valley area of Uzanbazar. The official said around 70 per cent pipe laying works have been completed. Water will be stored in 23 service reservoirs and distributed through a network of about 2,000 km long pipes, providing more than 2 lakh house connections. The three projects together aim to cover the entire estimated population with the supply of 135 litres per capita per day (LPCD) of water in the year 2025.

WASTE SEGREGATION IN HIMACHAL PRADESH

In Himachal Pradesh, Northern India, all 54 urban local bodies have been directed to start 100 % segregation of waste from April 1 as per directives of the National Green Tribunal. In workshop, the Chief Secretary said that the situation isn't satisfactory even three years after the notification of the Solid Waste Management Rules, 2016. So, three major cities, towns and at least three panchayats in every district might be notified on the website within two weeks as model cities/towns/villages which would be made fully compliant within six months and the remaining places might be made fully compliant in respect of environmental norms within one year.

RESEARCH ON GLACIERS ON THE QINGHAI-TIBET PLATEAU

The Director of the Institute of Tibetan Plateau Research has led researchers to drill into glaciers on the Qinghai-Tibet Plateau to collect information embedded in the ice core that help them solve the climate change mystery. The climate on the plateau is becoming warmer and more humid i.e. temperature rise is twice the global average. One of the discoveries was that glaciers on the Qinghai-Tibet Plateau and neighboring regions have shrunk by 15 percent in the past half century. China is investing big and promoting international cooperation in the scientific research of Qinghai-Tibet Plateau, which is key to the world's ecological environmental protection.
