A massive storm was hit in Bara and Parsa that was declared as first ever tornado in Nepal. Banke has become a new hub for wildlife smugglers. Two hydropower has been listed in the government scheme 'Nepal's Water, People' Investment' to encourage peoples' participation in investment. The Global Air 2019 report has indicated that the air quality is degrading in Nepalese context. 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MASSSIVE STORM IN SOUTH-CENTRAL NEPAL

A massive storm hit Bara and Parsa districts of southern Nepal that killed 28 individuals and injured over 600 people. Immediate rescue and relief operations were being carried out by government and local organizations in the affected area. Meteorological Forecasting Division stated that this extreme case of storm was unusual in Nepal's context, and has been confirmed to be the first ever tornado in Nepal, which had 200-250 meter wide and covered at least 30 kilometers in these two districts.

BANKE BECOME A NEW HUB FOR WILDLIFE SMUGGLERS

Banke District of western Nepal is being used as an emerging smuggling area for poached animals including red panda (*Ailurus fulgens*), tiger (*Panthera tigris*) and elephant (*Elephas maximus*). A person was arrested with the skin of red panda, and an investigation identified the Kohalpur, Ranjha and Nepalgunj cities of Banke District were used as market hub by the poachers.

HYDROPOWER PROJECTS INCORPORATED

Under the Ministry of Energy, Water Resources and Irrigation, two hydropower projects: Sanjen Hydropower (42.5 MW) and Rasuwa Hydropower (111 MW) have been listed in the government scheme 'Nepal's Water, People's Investment'- so as to encourage people's participation in investment. A Twenty five percent of the project's share has been issued as initial public offering out of which 15 % is for general public and 10 % for project affected people.

DEGRADING NEPAL'S AIR QUALITY

The Global Air 2019 report indicated that air pollution level (PM 2.5 exposure) was recorded highest in Nepal ($\underline{100}$ $\underline{\mu g/m3}$) followed by India (91 $\underline{\mu g/m3}$), Bangladesh (61 $\underline{\mu g/m3}$), and Pakistan (58 $\underline{\mu g/m3}$) in South Asia. However, PM 2.5 exposure in Maldives was recorded 7.8 $\underline{\mu g/m3}$, which is the lowest in the region. In Nepal, around 65% (19 million) households were found to use solid cooking fuels in 2017.

WILD ANIMALS FARMING

With an aim to control illegal poaching of wildlife, the Ministry of Forest is formulating a new policy that allows local people to breed wild animals in households. The minister for Forest and Environment stated that this new policy will help to control the wildlife poaching. Recently issued 'National Forest Policy' promotes private company, cooperative and the local community for wildlife farming, its commercialization and import. However, the list of wildlife that will be included under this policy has not been finalized yet.

MOUNT EVEREST BEING REMEASURED

The height of Mount Everest is being measured by the Survey Department to confirm if the peak's height has been changed after the 2015 massive earthquake. Department has started this expedition with the cost of NPR 250 million since last year and two of the department's employees have been sent for this expedition this week. The department will announce the outcome within 9 months.

HABITAT OF RARE SPECIES THREATENED

The construction of new road in northern rim of Chitwan Valley, south-central Nepal that extends from Mathillo Kaule to Gadi threatens the Gadi-Siraichuli Forest. This forest is listed as an Important Bird and Biodiversity Area (IBA) that is home to many endangered and endemic species including Spiny Babbler (*Turdoides nipalensis*) and Black Giant Squirrel (*Ratufa bicolor*).

A plea in the form of Public Interest Litigation (PIL) filed for closedown of slaughterhouses has been heard by the High court. Illegal slaughterhouses that do not comply with the norms are ordered to be shut down by mid-July or force to comply.

The government of India granted Rs. 5.84 million to Islamic University of Science and Technology to study effect of climate change on Kashmir Himalayan Region. This project will focus on Odonata (Class Insecta) as an indicator species to predict effects of climate change and aims to study the various aspects of conservation including taxonomy, distribution and diversity, ecology and monitoring of this insect.

HIGH COURT AGAINST POLLUTING INDUSTRIES

Uttarakhand High Court in northern India has directed the state government to close down 12 industrial units that have severely violated norms and standards. In August 2018, the High Court ordered the Central Pollution Control Board to submit a compliance report of 323 factories that pollute the environment, and the board reviewed 135 units and found 12 severely guilty.

The recent survey on the white-bellied heron (*Ardea insignis*) found the population of 25 individuals, a slight increase in its population to 24 last year. This indicates Bhutan rich in biodiversity and its habitat intact.

HAILSTORM DAMAGES CROPS

Fields around Trongsa, central Bhutan was experienced the hailstorm that destroyed chili (*Capsicum frutescens*), buckwheat (*Fagopyrum esculentum*), cardamom (*Elettaria cardamomum*), maize (*Zea mays*), potato (*Solanum tuberosum*) and orange (*Citrus X sinensis*). Chili is a major cash crop in Trongsa. Even in Jamkhar of eastern Bhutan, hailstorm destroyed potatoes.
